My 4 years at the academy were a very non-traditional, hands on and interactive learning environment. This is the only industry I see myself in.


I sailed as a Marine Engineer on Deepwater Drill ships [initially]. When I shifted to a shore based career, I have taken on Sales Engineering and Project Management for marine propulsion systems, and then switched to Operations as a Logistics Manager. Today, I am the VP of Sales & Logistics over a fleet of 65 inland towboats and interact with customers and operations on a daily basis to ensure work for each and every vessel and that the vessels are safely operating to generate revenue for the company. I am continually creating and building strong relationships with customers in the industry to support their needs as well.





Always follow your heart when it comes to your career. If you don't truly love the industry, maybe your passion is in a different field. This industry has something to offer for everyone from hands on, to clerical work, to administrative staff, to management and leadership type roles.

I did not grow up around the industry. I fell in love with it on my own, and my family is learning a whole new world through my eyes and my career path. It is something we all enjoy talking about together.



Whitney Cruse Vice President of Barge Logistics at Marquette Transportation Company Western Kentucky Chapter President

I graduated from Murray State University with a Business Degree in May of 2008. I knew absolutely nothing about towboats or barges when I was hired as a Boat Logistics Coordinator at Maquette that September. That role was mostly administrative and data entry focused, but I took every opportunity to learn more. In the fall of 2009, I was promoted to Boat Logistics Manager. My first river segment to dispatch was the Lower Mississippi River. During those harvest months, the environment was fast pace and the work was like trying to put together different puzzles with the same pieces…every day. It was fun, frustrating, and oddly, furthered my passion for the industry.

Over the next eight years, I had my turn at dispatching each river segment. Customers communicated to me their towing needs. I, then, implemented tow plans for our boats by coordinating barge pick-ups and drops. In February of 2017, excited for a new challenge, I had the opportunity to lead our Barge Logistics Team. As Vice President of Barge Logistics, it has been my privilege to lead a team of 6 dispatchers that have the same pride as I do. Our main goal is to ensure our barges are moving as efficiently and cost effectively as possible. So we spend our days in constant communication with our sales team, freight owners, fleet dispatchers and towers. We do a lot of problem solving and negotiating too. Occasionally, we have slower paced days, but rarely are any days dull. I learn something new from either someone in the industry or from a new situation to work through.



[My favorite part of the maritime industry is] the people in it! I'm so thankful for the relationships built over the last 12 plus years. Especially, thankful for those that took time to teach me when I didn't even know the difference between a boat and a barge. God bless them! Their pride and passion was then passed along to me. Additionally, I get so excited when finally meeting someone for the first time after talking by phone and emails for years.

What advice do you have for others in the industry?

Never stop learning. If you are interested in something whether in your department or not, ask questions. I believe the more you know the better understanding of the big picture you will have which is very valuable for personal and professional growth.

A fun fact:

My in-laws bought me a table saw for Christmas because I was often borrowing theirs. I have several projects on my wish list to build when weather warms up.

Caroline Abbott IMarine Engineer at Marine Spill Response Corporation Houston Chapter President

I have been in the Maritime industry for 6.5 years. Prior to joining the industry, I graduated from Texas A&M University at Galveston (TAMUG) where I studied Marine Engineering Technology.

For the first 6 years on my career, I worked as a Staff Surveyor where I had two (2) different types styles of work. The first half of my job involved working as a third-party project manager/port engineer for hire. My job was to oversee the day-to-day repairs and inspections when the vessels were on dry dock. I was the customers' representation in the shipyard, responsible for everything from engine overhauls, to steel repairs and various safety inspections. I was also responsible for ensuring all Regulatory (USCG) and Classifications Society requirements were met during the survey period. When I wasn't working on a docking, I conducted a wide range of surveys including P&I, vessel damage, condition and valuation, on/off hire condition, pre-purchase, draft surveys, cargo condition and damage, and marine structure damage surveys.


Building upon my surveying foundation, I moved into oil spill recovery at Marine Spill Response Corporation (MSRC) where I work as a Marine Engineer focusing on the Gulf Region. My responsibilities are similar to my previous port engineer experience except now I supervise the docking and repairs of MSRC equipment instead of third-party equipment. At MSRC my responsibilities also include drafting shipyard specifications and evaluating bids and proposals. Additionally, I supply technical engineering direction for vessel modifications, equipment upgrades and repairs for our Gulf Region response sites.

My favorite part of the industry is that each day presents new challenges. I find new and exciting opportunities around every corner.

While there is no doubt this industry can be hard, especially on woman, it can also be very rewarding. My advice is, show up, put in the work, and stand up for yourself because no one else will. Engaging with the woman in the maritime community is critical because not only can they provide technical support, but they can relate to your experiences.

An interesting fact:

While attending TAMUG I worked as a student technician where I taught fabrication and welding.I also love crafting and DIY which has resulted in my collection of 14 wreaths.




